



stereotype," East Campus students are considered more responsible, more responsive and more enthusiastic than other students. The problems of vandalism and theft which characterize the high-rise City Campus dormitories are not found on East Campus, Strait added.

But students were not as responsive to Strait's suggestions as his stereotypes might have been. Strait talked about the communications gap and proposed setting up a committee to discuss the problems. But as more and more complaints were raised and the 90 minute meeting drug on, the students wearied of those suggestions. Murmurs of "bullshit" ran across the back row of students.

Finally, a file of letters to the Housing Office and replies dating back to December 1969 was produced. Requests for desk chairs which fit under the desks, bathtubs for the woman's restrooms and

sufficient heat during winter predominated. The replies from the Housing Office explained that budgetary limitations prevented immediate action and promised the requests would be considered in the next year's budget.

The chairs still do not fit under desks, heat is still spotty and sometimes simply not there and there are no bathtubs in the women's restroom, yet.
