

March to Capitol supports Indians

With clapping and chants of "free Wounded Knee" a group, mostly UNL students, Friday marched from the State Historical Society to the State Capitol to show support for the Indians in Wounded Knee, S.D.

The march was planned by the recently formed United Minorities and Concerned Peoples' organization at UNL in coordination with Nebraska leaders of the American Indian Movement (AIM).

"It takes an incident like Wounded Knee to bring our people together," said John Two Birds Arbuckle, AIM leader, after the group of about 140 arrived at the Capitol.

He said the Indians' actions in Wounded Knee were an effort "to make the government negotiate." In the past, he said, in instances like Wounded Knee, Indians were asked to throw down their arms with the promise that the government would listen to them.

However, he said, when the Indians did that, nothing was ever accomplished. "Our people aren't throwing down their arms anymore," he said.

The group made two stops during their march. The first was at the Elks Club, which minority people can't enter "unless they're picking up cigarette butts or something like that," according to Arbuckle.

Pershing Auditorium was the second stop. Ago Sheridan, state coordinator for AIM, said that Gen. John J. Pershing, whom the auditorium was named for, was a young officer at

the Wounded Knee massacre in 1890.

"You massacre people and they erect buildings like that in your honor," he said.

Sheridan said that Wounded Knee could have been avoided "if they just sat down when we asked them." He denounced the government for not following up on the agreements made to the Indians who took over the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C. last year.

He also said that if Gov. James Exon continues to refuse to meet with Indian leaders, "we'll force him to have a meeting."

The march began at the State Historical Society to protest the display of Indian artifacts there, particular "a sacred medicine bundle," according to Arbuckle. If artifacts continue to be displayed, "we'll be hitting buildings like this hard," Sheridan said.
