# Convocation honors UNL students, faculty

Presentation of six distinguished teaching awards and four C.S. Boucher Awards highlighted the 45th Annual Honors Convocation held Tuesday in the Coliseum. About 2,700 dudents were honored.

The Chancellor's Award, given for the first time, went to Lewience Berger, professor of law. Robert Hough, professor of Emplish, won the Annis Chaikin Sorensen Award for Illumpurshed teaching in the humanities.

Other winners of Distinguished Teaching Awards were Jurces Cavett, assistant professor of elementary education, Jacqueline Voss, assistant professor of human development and the family, Gary Peterson, associate professor of manipulation, and Robert Fuller, associate professor of physics. Each winner received \$1,000 and a Distinguished Teaching

The Boucher Awards go to the Officers Training Corps and senior athletic letterman, senior woman, and senior man who have the highest four-year cumulative grade average.

Robert Krecklow, journalism major, won the ROTC award with his 3.627 average. Mathematics major and football player David Mason won the athletic award with his 3.132 average.

Heading the senior women was Marilyn Johnson, mathematics major, who has a 4,067 average. Highest overall average was recorded by senior male winner Ronald Aerni, chemical engineering major. He has a 4,072 average.

Superior scholarship awards went to 263 seniors who ranked in the upper three per cent of their college or who have been on the honors list since their freshman year. A number of students in all classes were recognized for high scholarship.


