

Police, student dialogues to begin

To get better acquainted with students, UNL Campus Security has started a public relations program, according to Gail Gade, chief of Campus Security.

Gade said he is considering the feasibility of having Campus Security officers participate in discussion sessions with fraternal, cultural, fraternities and other organizations.

"We want groups to invite us out so that the people in our department can get better acquainted with students and students can get better acquainted with them," he said. "This way we can understand each other's objectives and work toward a common goal."

Another part of the program is to get students to use electric engravers to mark personal items.

Gade, a newspaper editor, has asked all of their personal stores, including their credit cards, to be marked with their identification number.

That way, if a student's identification card is lost, he said, the owner will be able to identify the article marked.

"We keep these registration books on file according to social security numbers so that when something is found, we have a greater chance of returning it," he said. "This is mainly for the student's protection."

The idea of electric engraving is still in its infancy, Gade said, but it is hoped that it will help to reduce the number of lost items.

As always, Gade said, the program is going well. But at this point, he said, he is not sure if it is "paying off."
