

## Complaint about bus may be unfounded

A complaint about poor bus service between the Lincoln end Omaha NU campuses may be unfounded, according to Miles Tommerassen, vice chancellor of business and

Michael Whye, a senior taking classes at both campuses complained last Thursday to the Council on Student Life (CSL).

ICSL).

He said a bus scheduled to leave Lincoln at 5 p.m. left at 4:50 p.m. causing him to miss it on January 29. Because he had a 6 p.m. class on the UNL campus, he contacted Ray Coffey, assistant business manager.

"Rey got a University car to drive me and another person who had missed the bus to Omsha," Whye said.

He also said the bus leaving Omaha at 7 a.m. for the Lincoln campus is actually just a car which is always crowded. The bus leaving at 12:30 p.m., however, is a van able to carry 12 to 14 people. "Usually there are only two or three people riding on it," Whye noted.

"If they adjusted who used the van and who used the

"If they adjusted who used the van and who used the car, the situation would be a lot better," he said.

Tommeraesen said the bus service was not set up to

"It was set up originally as a mail service," he said. "Later they said it could haul people if there were those

needing rides back and forth."

The line is mainly a mail service from the Statehouse to Omaha. The schedule is planned by the Department of

Administrative Services.

Noting the state's control over all public utilities, including transportation, Tommerassen said, "If one were to set up a bus line, you'd get into an entirely different situation."

Don Shaneyfelt, CSL chairman, said he would bring the complaint to the attention of the "appropriate persons."

He said he would notify Ron Wright, assistant director

of business and finance, about the problem.
"If there continues to be problems, we can look into things further," Shaneyfelt said. "The people responsible often are willing to change things once problems are brought to their attention."
