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## Swimmers seek exit from Big 8 cellar

Today through Sunday the Husker swimming team will be participating in the Big 8 Conference meet at Boulder, Colo.

Last year at this meet, UNL finished in last place. According to Husker Swimming Coach John Reta, UNL has improved over last year, but, he said, every other conference team has improved also.

He tabbed defending champion the University of Kansas as an almost sure repeat winner, "although Colorado, Missouri and Iowa State could make things close."

Husker hopes rest on freshman Paul Duxbury in the 50-yard freestyle, freshman John Williams in the 200-yard individual medley and freshman Jack Alexander in the 500-yard and 1,000-yard freestyle events. The all-freshman 400-yard medley relay team of Noem Jackman, Stu Waterbury, Rick Redfield and Scott Martin have a good chance at placing, according to Reta.

lowa State University Swimming Coach Jack McGuire describes the Cornhusker swimming squad as "one of the best in Nebraska history." Reta said his team has but five lettermen, no seniors and only two juniors.

Alexander, who now holds Husker records in both the 500-and 1000-yard freestyle events, said the UNL squad will be a better team during the conference meet than any other time this year.
