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Herald and a mailed learning kit containing additional instructional materials. The additional materials vary from course to course and include audio tape cassettes, workbooks and readings.

Students enrolling "for credit" will pay tuition of \$18 per credit hour, or \$54 per course plus materials fess of about \$25. Students enrolling "not for credit" will pay an audit fee of one-half the tuition charge, or \$27 per course plus materials fees.

S-U-N Provost Melvin D. George said credit for both courses, as well as for other courses under development, will be offered through the appropriate departments of the University of Nebraska campuses. As such, said George, the credit will be readily transferable to other colleges in Nebraska and in other states.

One feature of the S-U-N program was explained by Hassel, who said learning centers, located initially in Scottsbluff, Kearney, Lincoln and Omaha, will be established as regional centers where adults can receive information on post-high school learning opportunities convenient to them and where S-U-N students can get counseling advice.

Eventually, as many as 25 learning centers may dot the state. By that time, said George, S-U-N will offer credit courses equivalent to the first two years of college, plus a number of special interest or professional development courses.

SUN classes beginning

A new course of study produced by S-U-N, Accounting 1 will offer to Nebraskans a college-at-home equivalent to university-level introductory accounting.

S-U-N students will study financial reports for businesses from the large corporation to the individually owned business. They will learn about types of financial information necessary for sound business planning, as well as the procedures for financial statement preparation.

The course was chosen as one of S-U-N's first because of the high ranking it received in S-U-N's several market surveys, which sought opinions from citizens who said they would be interested in enrolling in college-at-home courses.

The resident content consultant is Pierre L. Titard, a Lincoln campus accounting professor, and the producer is Marshall Jamison, a nationally known television producer and director. Richard W. Metcalf, another Lincoln campus

accounting professor, has also served as a content consultant and co-author with Titard of the textbook for the course.

S-U-N's Introductory Psychology course, in contrast with the S-U-N-produced Accounting 1, is one which draws from existing content material which has been adapted and modified for S-U-N use.

It will introduce the student to general psychological theory through study of a dozen contemporary experimental examples, ranging from arguments on school busing to study of the effect of environment on intelligence.

Among study materials will be readings and films by the publishers of 'Psychology Today."

Psychology was chosen as a S.U.N course because it, too, ranked high on market surveys.

David Levine, a Lincoln campus psychology professor on leave, is the resident content consultant, and James Craig, S-U-N production services coordinator, will produce the course.

Registration for Introductory Psychology will begin August 15 and close October 15. The course formally begins November 3.
