

Ski club planning Colorado trips

Members of the NU Ski Club realize the limitations of the surrounding terrain.

"You can't ski in Nebraska," acknowledges Tom Wattonville, who along with Dea Ferris and John Schulling, is busy promoting the club. "You have to get to Colorado and that's what we're trying to do."

The three rationalize that if more people make the annual junkets to

Colorado, the individual cost will be less, so they are in the midst of an enthusiastic membership drive.

This year the club is tentatively planning trips to Vail and Steamboat Springs.

Ferris, Schulling and Wattonville are all Juniors. Before they became involved in the club's activities, skiing was not prominent at NU.

"When I was a freshman there were supposedly five people in the ski club here," Wattonville recalls. "But I never saw any of them."

This year close to 200 members are expected with room for more. The club is open to anyone, although the trio of ski enthusiasts agreed that a five-year old beginner would likely be turned down. Dues for the year are \$5; the

tentative Colorado trip would cost no more than \$150.

The club is planning a bus ride to Omaha to attend a ski show Oct. 9. The show will feature the latest ski equipment.

Besides the trips and the chance to meet people, Ferris cited another reason to join Ski Club.

"If you go somewhere by yourself, you are going to get ripped off," she warns.

If the Nebraska football team beats Colorado this year, the club's members might find something getting ripped off anyway. The bold snow riders will be wearing cowboy hats emblazoned with "University of Nebraska Ski Club" on their trip to Colorado.

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
