

Nebraska pleads no contest

Game analysis by Steve Taylor.

The Nebraska Cornhuskers raised their record to 2-1 Saturday with a methodical 49-7 drubbing of Northwestern University. Though Husker passers accumulated 172 yards through the airways, it was a hard-driving stable of running backs which caused the lopsided win.

Surprisingly, the individual standout of the noncontest was freshman back Monte Anthony, who scarcely more than a month ago was playing in Memorial Stadium as a Shrine Bowl player.

Usually the sight of a freshman in the Cornhusker backfield is rare, but Anthony convinced fans he belonged there by rushing for 111 yards in 14

'Monte has as much ability as any freshman we've had here in quite a while," Head Coach Tom Osborne commented. However, he later added that people shouldn't count too heavily

on Anthony starting next week.

Most of Anthony's damage inflicted on the bewildered wildcat defense was done from the I-back spot.

Gaping holes Nebraska runners frequently found gaping holes while cavorting for 391 yards. Altogether, the Husker's total offense was a whopping 563 yards.

Don Westbrook scored the first of Nebraska's seven touchdowns by slithering five yards on a reverse. It was the fourth TD of the season for Westbrook, who has established himself as the Huskers' most lethal scoring threat.

Nebraska's other six endzone thrusts also came on short runs. Earl Everett and Dave Gillespie each barged across the goal line twice and Monte Anthony and Jeff Moran scored on 3-yard runs. At halftime it was 35-0.

The Husker defense was unyielding, allowing Northwestern a scant 181 total yards. Wildcats quarterback Steve Moor lusually a third-stringer but a starter Saturday because of injuries) attempted only 15 passes, completing four. His reluctance to throw was disappointing to Nebraska Defensive Coach Monte Kiffin.

"Our kids were hoping they would throw more," he said. "We worked more on pass defense this week."

Kiffin said the defensive secondary has regained its confidence after the regretable loss to the Wisconsin Bad-

Far from average

Northwestern was far from formidable, far from even being average, so the question lingers.

The phrases, varying in their descriptions of the sport are worn by members of all rugby clubs to attract attention and promote interest in the sport of rugby; according to team member Mike Potter.

A major goal of the UNL club this year is to gain support and become more established on campus, Potter said. The UNL Rugby Club is not university funded, so it must be self-supporting or members must find a sponsor for their organization.

Coach Adrian George, assistant professor of chemistry at UNL, began his first season of rugby coaching this semester. George said, however, he was an active participant in the sport before coming to the United States from England eight years ago. George added that rugby originated in England and that American football was derived from the sport. Amateur sport

Rugby is mainly an amateur sport although many clubs, including some in the Big 8, are university budgeted. Iowa State, for example, receives \$1,200 each year and Creighton University in Omaha has a season budget of \$1,000 for rugby.

The UNL rugby club's first win was early in the season against Kansas City. The second was a 12-10 win over Creighton two weeks ago.
