Relay honors anniversary

Twelve Marine Officer Candidates will conduct a 62-mile relay run from Lincoln to Omaha on Oct. 19 to commemorate the 19th anniversary of the Marine Corps (Nov. 10), Capt. David P. Evans, Marine Office Instructor of the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (NROTC), said Thursday.

Evans, who will participate in and supervise the run, said it will begin at 6 a.m. at the Military and Navel Science Bldg. on the UNL campus and will end at about 5 p.m. at the Union Pacific Building in downtown Omaha.

The relay will be conducted in five-mile segments, with all the participants running the first and last mile together.

Marine Officer Candidates from two officer training programs, NROTC, Marine Option and the Platoon Leader Candidate (PLC) program will run. Evans said the relay will give candidates from the two programs a chance to share their experiences, as well as serve as a conditioning exercise for them.

Tim Evensen, one of the runners, said motivation is the key word for students in the Marine Candidate program and especially for those participating in the run.

Representing the Marine Candidate Program, Evans said he challenges the Air Force or Army ROTC programs to a relay run "of any distance on any day."

Participating in the run are Evensen, Evans, Peter Keenan, Keith Wotherpoon, Brian King, James Bailey, Robert Gose, Gunther Feiste, James Radosevich, Frank Esposito, Rex Nolan and Michael Regan.
