Its greatest attraction is the relaxed, conversational prose style that is soothing to the mind. The amateuristic misspellings and sometimes uncredible syntatic juggling, win hands down as the friendliest style around.

My favorite is the Christmas catalogue published by New York Metropolitan Museum of Art. Offering what are possibly the most beautiful Christmas cards in America, the catalogue has grown slowly over the past few years into an exquisitely printed, flat-bound volume. The museum offers ancient jewelry, sculpture, calendars, books and reproductions of early American glassware.

The greatest joys of the catalogue are its illustrations, which cover almost every item listed. The color is luminous, and the black-and-white reproductions are printed clearly. All descriptions are written in unadorned crystal-clear prose.
