



70 departments offer degrees through UNL Graduate College

Ins 1886, 17 years after the University of Nebraska was created, graduate instruction

In 1896, a graduate school was organized which became the Graduate College 13 years

Today more than 70 departments at the University offer graduate degrees.

During the 1974 fall semester, 969 doctoral, 1,308 master's and 820 unclassified students were enrolled in the Graduate College. This was 132 students less than in the 1973 fall semester.

Some enrollments increased Despite the decline, adult education, architecture, business, industrial engineering and life sciences enrollments have increased.

The number of graduate students in the departments vary with as few as one student in paleontology and as many as 182 in business. More than 600 graduate students have no departmental designation, or are unclassified.

The departments offer about 800 teaching and research positions to graduate students

during the regular academic year. Stipends for these range from about \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year for an average of 12 to 15 hours per week.

Fellowships and traineeships also are available to graduate students.

During the 1974-75 fall semester, 699 male and 268 female graduate students were given support as assistants, fellows, and trainees.

Assistantships through departments

The assistantships are budgeted through the departments awarding them, with approval from the Graduate College. The fellowships and traineeships are available from government agencies and private foundations.

Graduate students with major fellowships or traineeships are not allowed to have other employment without permission of the dean, James V. Drew.

The administrative body for graduate studies UNL is the graduate council. It also serves as an advisory body to the dean and consists of eight graduate faculty fellows and two students.

The eight faculty members are elected by the Graduate College faculty for terms of three

The University of Nebraska rowing team Thursday night was Crew team allocated \$3,200 for the rest of the 74-75 school year by the Fees Allocation Board. The money was given "with the understanding given funds the board will look unfavorably on any additional requests for given funding during the spring funding process."

Ron Rusthoven, coach of the rowing team, appeared before the for shell board and requested \$5,895 to purchase a new eight man shell and three new sets of oars. The shell costs \$3,195 and the oars cost \$900 per set.

A motion to provide the team with \$4,100 to purchase the shell and one set of oars failed, 6-2. The second motion allocating \$3,200 passed, 5-3. Both motions included the understanding that the rowing team not ask for any more money during the 74-75 school year.
