

Zumberge departs leaving history of UNL change

 UNL Indian students began a boycott of the Minority Affairs Office and presented the UNL administration a list of demands. The State University of Nebraska (SUN) began its progressive program for higher education, which utilized the media to offer college courses to Nebraska residents in their homes.
 The price of university parking permits was raised from \$15 to \$25.
 The name of the Systems Office Building was changed to Regents Hall.
 The associative living program was initiated, with males and females living in separate wings of the same floor on two floors in Abel Hall.
 Gerald Rudolph assumed the duties of Dean of Libraries.
 Cary Brantz ran as a write-in candidate for home-coming queen and won, but was disqualified at the time for allegedly

campaigning at the polls. The opinion was later reversed by the Student Court.
 ASUN President Ron Clingenpeel was sworn in as UNL's first student member of the Board of Regents.
 The Family Rights and Privacy Act allowing students to see their school records went into effect.
 Spring 1975
 UNL's Campus Police became the first police force in the state to arm its women police officers and give them patrol duty in cruisers.
 Josh McDowell, an international representative of Campus Crusade for Christ appeared on the UNL campus, causing debate over the NU Board of Regent's policy concerning religious activities on campus.
 The UNL Faculty Senate approved academic bankruptcy, which allows one semester's grades to be removed from

consideration when determining a student's cumulative grade point average.
 Melvin George, dean of UNL's College of Arts and Sciences, left to become vice president for academic affairs at the University of Missouri.
 Duane Acker, vice chancellor of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, left to become president of Kansas State University.
 UNL revived Chautauqua, a traveling tent show that brought drama, debate and music to early America, and presented it to six Nebraska communities between May 30 and June 10.
 The UNL Extension Division became the largest university-based independent

study program in the nation, with 14,318 students.
 The UNL Law College moved into a new building on East Campus, and U.S. Atty. Gen. Edward Levi appeared for the dedication of the new building.
 The NU Board of Regents voted to allow UNL students in the UNO-based Criminal Justice program to graduate from UNL. Previously, criminal justice majors were required to graduate from UNO even though they never attended classes on the UNO campus.
 Venezuela Ahora, a three week festival sponsored by UNL and the Venezuelan government as a bicentennial tribute to the United States, was presented.
