Bakery plans rise

Are you missing mom's home cooking? Do you crave freshly-baked sweet rolls or find your mouth watering for oatmeal cookies?

These delicacies may have been hard for students to come by, but when classes resume in January, there might be a retail bakery in the Nebraska Union.

Al Bennett, Union Director, is the man with the doughnut dreams.

The only obstacle is money.

"We have some money on hand," Bennett said. "If cost and design match, we're going to go ahead."

Jack Scott, design draftsman from UNL's Physical Plant and the project's chief designer, said plans will be discussed this week, but it will be 30 to 40 days before a design is finished.

Bennett said cost is hard to estimate.

Planned location for the bakery is west of the south desk on the south wall of the south Crib, where an Overseas Opportunity Center (OOC) bulletin board now hangs. Bennett said plans include a colonial-style candy store front with a display case inside.

The Union Food Service, which buys many products wholesale and sells them at retail, "should be able to provide better products for the same prices, if a bakery is opened," Bennett said.

He said Purdue University, Oklahoma State University and several other schools have successful retail bake shops.

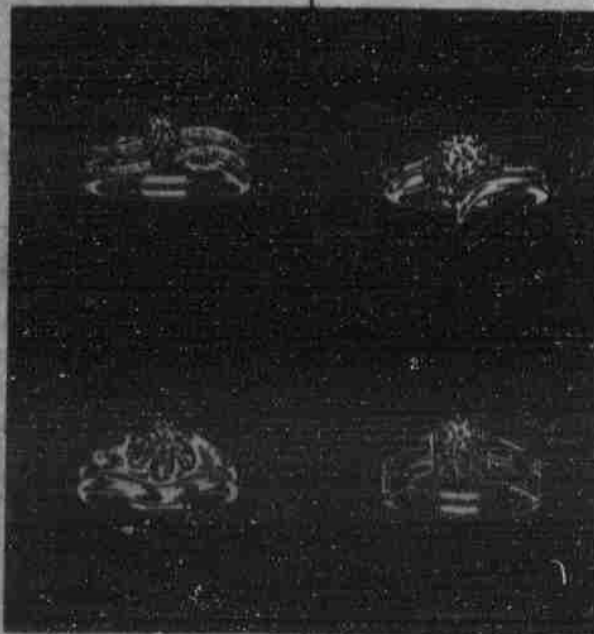
