Chairperson for the 1977 Model United Nations (MUN) committee will be chosen later in February since no one applied for the job, Brown said, porbably because prospective applicants wait to see how successful the February MUN Conferance is.

2. Intermediate Value.

Current edition textbooks which may be used for upcoming semesters but which have not yet been ordered by the instructor are bought at speculative prices between wholesale value and top value. About half of these books will move up in value and half will decrease in value as we get more information on class requirements.

3. Wholesale Value.

Current edition textbooks no longer being used on the UNL campus can often be purchased by Nebraska Book Company for resale to schools in other parts of the United States. Prices on these books vary according to the national demand for each title.

4. Limited Value.

Old edition textbooks and most paperbacks fall into this category. Check our prices and then decide whether or not to keep these books for your personal library or for future reference use.
