National president of Kappa Delta Sorority Jean Tucker Jackson of Lincoln was honored Sunday at an afternoon tea at the UNL chapter house.

A.W. Epp, UNL professor of agricultural economics, was presented a Distinguished Service Award by the Nebraska Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers at its annual meeting last week.

Epp has been on the UNL agricultural economics

staff for 32 years and is a charter member of the Society. He has conducted research in sandhill ranching, farm organization and irrigation, served as acting director of the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station in the early 1960s, and has served for many years as secretary of the Nebraska Hall of Agricultural Achievement.

Doyle Onnen of Hebron and Karen Siffring of Rising City have been awarded \$400 Lincoln Grain Exchange scholarships.

The scholarship is awarded to first-year transfer students, sophomores or

seniors majoring in agricultural economics or agronomy. Winners are selected by the agricultural college scholarship committee.

Both junior agronomy majors, Onnen is a transfer from Southeast Community College, Fairbury campus while Siffring is a transfer from Nebraska Wesleyan University.

Louis I. Leviticus, engineer in charge of the NU Tractor Testing Laboratory, will attend the International Standards Organization Conference in Frankfurt,

West Germany, Feb. 6-14. He said the purpose of the conference is to adopt standards for a world-wide tractor testing code.

"There are many differences in our operating conditions (among countries) that must be resolved first," Leviticus said.

He said he will work for a code that will be acceptable and practical for all countries, adding that he did not think the European method of testing would be practical for the United States.

According to Leviticus, Nebraska law says tractors must be tested in the state, to be sold here.
