

Ralph Abernathy to speak

Ralph Abernathy, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) will speak in the Nebraska Union Thursday night at 7:30. The public event is sponsored by the Nebraska Union Program Council's Black Activities Committee.

Abernathy became SCLC president after the 1968 assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. He rose to national prominence in 1955-56 when he and other black leaders, including King, led the Montgomery, Ala. bus boycott.

A graduate of Alabama College, he

received an M.A. in Sociology from Atlanta University.

Abernathy, 49, was a founder of the Montgomery Improvement Association, the direct forerunner of the SCLC. He serves as President Emeritus of that organization and currently is pastor of West Hunter Street Baptist Church in Atlanta.

Abernathy will discuss "A Nation In Crisis." An informal rap session with Abernathy will be in the Harper Hall Lounge, 1150 N. 14th. St., after the talk.
