

Candidates square off; primary approaches

Former President Richard Nixon and the assistant chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Presidential Campaign Practices will be dueling it out again.

But this time the battle will not be over Watergate. Each has a Nebraska delegate candidate ready to vote for him at the Republican National Convention. Peter Tourins and Richard Recker have committed themselves to the presidential nominations of Nixon and Sen. Howard Baker, R-Tenn., respectively.

Tourins and Recker, both of Lincoln, join more than 500 other Nebraskans who have filed for delegate positions to the Democratic, Republican and American Parties national conventions.

This is the first year delegate candidates did not have to pay a filing fee.

Election filings for the May 11 Nebraska All Star Presidential Primary were still filtering in as the Friday evening deadline approached, according to an election official at the secretary of state's office.

Students seek regent seats

At 5 p.m., officials began to compile a final list of candidates:

Four NU Board of Regents members are up for reelection and UNL students will fight for two of those seats. Schuyler sophomore Charlie Krig, a journalism and theatre major has filed for incumbent Schuyler Regent Kermit Wagner's seat. Kenlon Johannes, a graduate student from Leigh, has filed for Grand Island Regent Robert Koefoot's seat.

Regents James Moylan of Omaha, Koefoot, Robert Prokop of Wilber and Wagner all have filed for the primary.

Among incumbents filing for the non-partisan Nebraska Legislature race, four face no opposition. They are Richard Marvel of Hastings, Herbert Duis of Gothenburg, Dennis Rasmussen of Scotia and Robert Clark of Sidney.

Eight senators have only one opponent, which guarantees them a spot on the general election ballot since, according to state statute, the two top vote-getters in the primary meet in the general election.

Familiar names

These senators are Orval Keyes of Springfield, George Syas of Omaha, Loran Schmit of Bellwood, Jerome Warner of Waverly, Ralph Kelly of Grand Island, Frank Lewis of Bellevue, John Murphy of South Sioux City and Leslie Stull of Alliance.

Familiar names also appear in unfamiliar places on the primary ballot.

Former Lincoln mayor Sam Schwartzkopf, who until recently managed Omaha's Big Green Lottery, has filed for the first congressional district Public Service Com-

missioner position. He has one opponent.

Former KETV newscaster Lee Terry of Omaha, having overcome legal barriers and natural forces, filed last week for the second district congressional seat. Terry first tried to file in Omaha, where he was told candidates must file in Lincoln. His trip to the state capitol then was delayed because of snow.

Terry is among four candidates for the Republican nomination.

State Sen. John Cavanaugh of Omaha runs unopposed for the second district congressional seat on the Democratic slate.

Omaha Mayor Edward Zorinsky filed for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Roman Hruska of Omaha. Two other candidates, Hess Dyas of Lincoln and Lenore R. Etchinson of Papillion, are also fighting for the Democratic nomination. Former State Sen. Richard Proud of Omaha and Rep. John McCollister of Omaha are hoping for the Republican senate nomination.

State Sen. John DeCamp of Neligh will oppose incumbent Virginia Smith of Chappell for the Republican spot on the third district congressional ticket.

Democrat Pauline Anderson of Lincoln and Republican incumbent Charles Thone, also of Lincoln, will battle for the first district congressional seat in September. Both will run unopposed on the primary ballot.

Anderson is married to Albin Anderson, a UNL history professor.
