The three finalist teams were what was left of 48 teams that went through elimination every Tuesday and Thursday night from Feb. 3 through Mar. 11, according to Trivia Bowl coordinator Jay Matzke, a freshman pre-med major from Sidney.

A special challenge match was held with Juris Law competing against a team comprised of Dick Perry, KFOR sportscaster; Ken Bader, vice-chancellor for student affairs; Monte Kiffin, defensive coordinator for the Husker football team and Nebraska Lt. Gov. Gerald Whelan.

Juris Law won 150 to 30. Gamma Gamma Awards for outstanding service to the Greek system were given after the bowl.

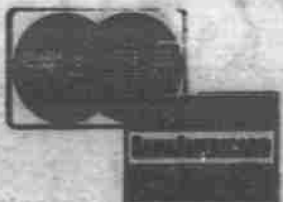
