

Surgeon practices what he preaches

What he calls a "burning desire to take education beyond our borders" has carried a well-known dental educator all over the world.

Dr. Dan Waite has traveled to four continents, toured on the S.S. Hope, a medical missionary ship, and has visited African grass huts and Chinese junks.

Waite, chairman of the division of oral surgery at the University of Minnesota, told 250 UNL dental students and instructors Friday that others than those in the dental field "have an obligation to take education to underprivileged countries."

"Whatever your walk of life is," he said, "there is an opportunity to serve."

Waite took time to come to UNL, he said, because he was asked to speak at the first Roger Zwetzig memorial lecture.

"I couldn't turn down the challenge of trying to tie (dentistry) to the gift of life," he said.

Zwetzig, who died of leukemia in 1974, would have been a senior dental student this year.

The oral surgeon said his philosophy was that it is a "privilege to serve."

Because of his desire to bring medical care to underdeveloped nations, Waite said, he applied for the World Health Organization program and a tour with the S.S. Hope in 1961.

"The entire program is built around education," he said. "The need for education is so great, to show these people there are ways to meet their needs."

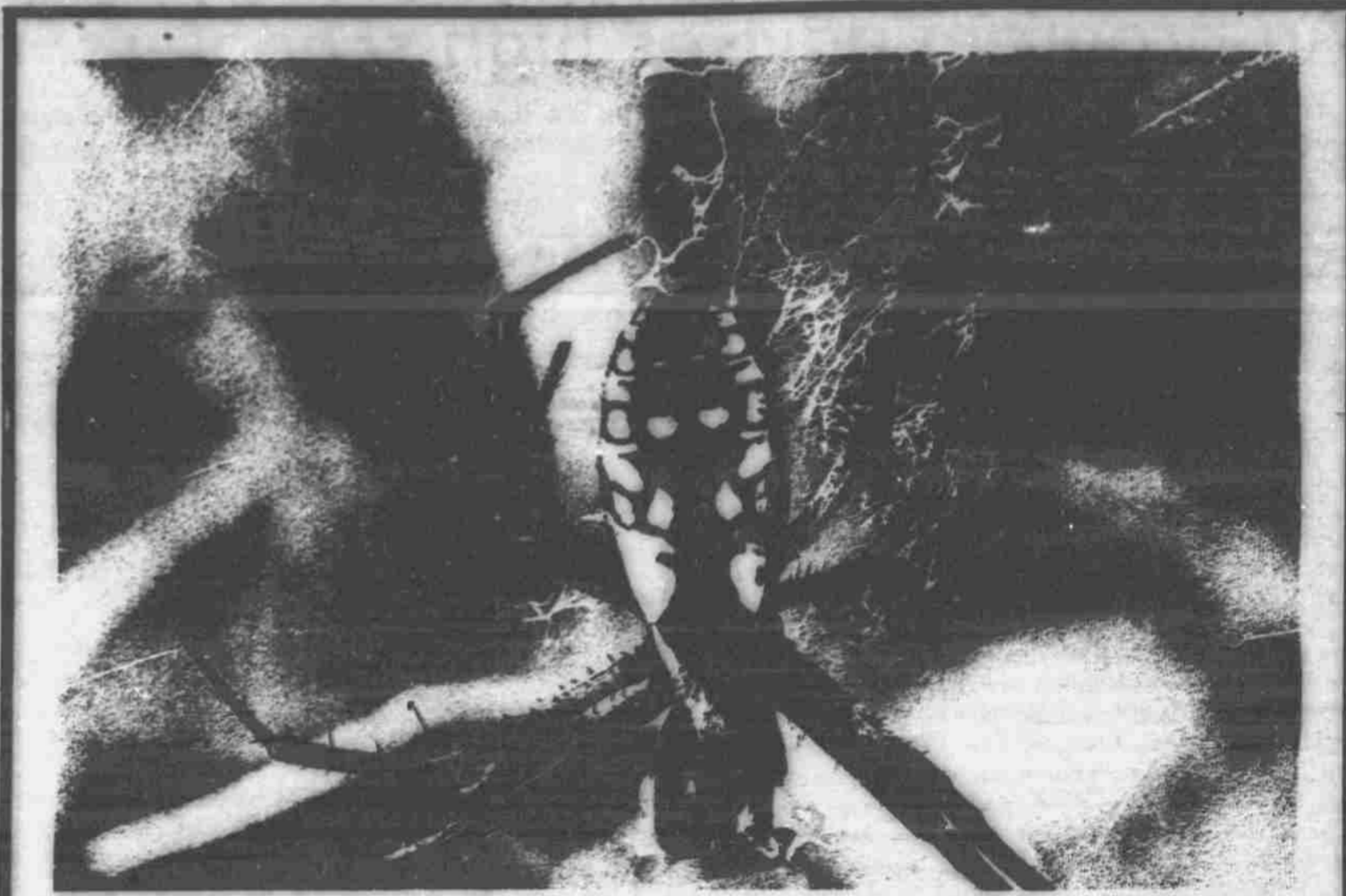
