

HPC forum hosts regent hopefuls

Candidates for the NU Board of Regents will participate in an open forum with UNL students today in Nebraska Union, said Robin Buchman, coordinator of the forum for the Housing Policy Committee, a Council on Student Life subcommittee.

The event will be in the Union north and south conference rooms from 3:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. Some candidates will eat lunch or dinner in UNL residence halls, she said.

The eight participating candidates are: from district three: Charlie Krig, a sophomore journalism and theater major from South Sioux City; district four: William Hood, a teacher from Bellevue; Willard Waldo, a DeWitt farmer, and James Winchell, a Beatrice dentist; district five: Mrs. Fred Seaton of Hastings and Kenlon Johannes, a UNL stu-

dent in the Graduate Studies College from Leigh, and district eight: the Rev. Darrel Berg of Lincoln and William Minier from Omaha.

A ninth candidate, Grand Island teacher Alton Kienker, will not attend the forum but will eat dinner in a residence hall, Buchman said.

Incumbent regent candidates James Moylan and Robert Prokop of Omaha, Kermit Wagner of Schuyler and Robert Koefoot of Grand Island declined invitations to the forum, Buchman said.

Buchman said her planning committee also has prepared a brochure for students and candidates unable to attend the forum, stating platforms of all regent candidates.

Speakers seek to 'open up worlds'

Thirty-nine UNL students from 16 academic departments will participate today in a workshop designed to show available opportunities in Lincoln for international careers.

The workshop will be from 1 to 5 p.m. at the National Bank of Commerce (NBC) Center, according to Allan Thorson, student workshop coordinator. Thorson, a senior in pre-med from Mead, said the workshop is sponsored by the UNL Department of University Studies.

Speakers at the workshops and their topics are:

-Brad Korell, NBC international banking officer, "Opportunities for Nebraska firms for overseas sales and dealing with overseas development banks."

-John Allington, president of Instruments Co., "Unique aspects of dealing with socialist governments."

-Stanley Esbenshade, director of manufacturing at Kawasaki of Lincoln, "Differing management philosophies in the international community."

-Allen Overcash, attorney with the Lincoln law firm of Woods, Aitken, Smith, Greer, Overcash and Spangler, the export-import bank.

-John Lee, chief of the wheat division of the Nebraska State Department of Agriculture and Marx Koehnke, also of the agriculture department, "International trade of agricultural commodities and foreign market development."

-Robert Hinds, senior vice-president and trust officer of the National Bank of Commerce, will give a welcoming address.

Nebraskan reporter wins Hearst award

Ron Ruggless, a sophomore journalism major from O'Neill, has won first place in the final monthly writing contest of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation's \$87,750 Journalism Awards Program.

Ruggless, a Daily Nebraskan reporter, becomes the fifth UNL School of Journalism student to place in the Hearst competition, placing UNL 6 of 63 schools which participate in the six-month national competition.

Ruggless won for his article which broke the news of the appointment of UNL's new chancellor, Roy Young of Oregon State University before it was announced by the NU Board of Regents. The story appeared in the Feb. 6 Daily Nebraskan.

"I really appreciate the support the staff and editors gave me," Ruggless said.

As winner of a \$1,200 scholarship, Ruggless will participate in the National Writing Championship in San Francisco next month. He will compete with seven other finalists in the series of writing contests sponsored by the foundation.

Other UNL Hearst winners were senior journalism majors Nancy Stohs of Grand Island who won a sixth place in feature writing, and Ray Walden of Grand Island, Lynn Roberts of Gehring and Deb Gray of Lincoln, who placed among the second 20 in the competition.
