

NU alumni, memories to return

Memories of football games, parties and old friends will return with 100 to 150 NU alumni for the 55th annual Alumni Reunion Friday and Saturday.

Graduating classes from 1926, 1936 and 1951 will be honored, said Carole Reno, alumni reunions director. The round-up will begin with a banquet and awards program at the Lincoln Elks Club Friday night, Reno said. Five UNL graduates will be presented alumni achievement awards for outstanding achievement since leaving the university.

Award recipients are: William Colwell, class of 1936, Hay Springs farmer; Donald Gonzales, 1939, vice-president for public affairs at the Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Foundation; Lewis Lehr, 1947, president of United States operations of the 3M Co.; Jeannette Olson Sidles, 1927, director of the Nebraska Metropolitan Opera district auditions; and Oak Smith, 1940, president of Wenger International and Wenger Overseas and director of marketing research for Wenger Manufacturing Co.

Three graduates also will receive Distinguished Service Awards (DSA) at the banquet, Reno said. The DSA was started in 1940 for distinguished service to the Alumni Association, the university, community, state or nation.

The three DSA recipients are: Paul Amen, 1938, board chairman of the National Bank of Commerce in Lincoln; Emmett Junge, 1926, retired director of the Lincoln Department of Public Welfare and Safety; and Dr. Foster Matchett, 1932, Denver orthopedic surgeon.

Student alumni board members and red carpet day hosts and hostesses will conduct tours of Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery, Morrill Hall and other campus landmarks, Reno said.

NU President D.B. Varner will address a Saturday luncheon and Interim Chancellor Adam Breckenridge will host an afternoon tea for the 1926 class.

Parties for each class at three Lincoln hotels will conclude the reunion, Reno said.

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Miltenerger concluded that, "I only hope that I will be able to rebuild the pride and quality in myself that I once had."

Commenting on allegations about lack of discipline on road trips, Sharpe said he prefers to treat his players as adults.

"We have no set training rules," he said. "We don't go around looking for trouble."

"You're always going to get dissatisfied players now and then," Sharpe said. "We try to treat every kid equal. We're sorry he quit."

Athletic Director Bob Devaney said he had not heard of Miltenerger's letter or allegations, but said he thought it was the opinion of a dissatisfied individual.

"I haven't heard all of the details, but every coach runs into an individual who wants publicity that he hasn't earned," Devaney said.
