## Varner to give regents budget increase proposal

A detailed recommendation of how much of an increase will be proposed for the 1977-78 NU budget will be presented by NU President D.B. Varner to the NU Board of Regents at their Sept. 8 meeting.

The regents gave Varner approval at their July 17 meeting to draft a budget that would increase tax-supported money to the university by at least 15 per cent.

Varner told the regents at the meeting that they should prepare for a five per cent increase in the cost of items purchased by the university

A five per cent tuition increase to reflect increases in the Consumer Price Index should also be expected, Varner said.

He also told the regents they should prepare for:

-A 10 to 14 per cent increase in the cost of utilities, hospital supplies and library materials.

-An across-the-board pay raise of six per cent for university employes, with an additional three per cent for faculty members.

-A total of \$3.84 million to improve educational programs. Of this money, UNL would receive \$1.7 million, the University of Nebraska at Omaha (UNO) and the University Medical Center would get \$850,000 each and the University Systems Office would receive \$445,000.

-\$500,000 to UNO to help that campus reach parity with UNL.

Additional funds will be needed for agricultural research and extension and possibly to offset losses in federal aid, Varner said.

Varner said he thinks the \$500,000 to UNO to achieve parity is the maximum amount of money that campus could use efficiently for improvements for one year.
