The sale of UNL season football and basketball student tickets continues today and Friday in the Coliseum,

Season football tickets -cost \$20 for six home games and basketball tickets cost \$8 for 11 games in the new NU Sports Complex.

The Colineum will be open from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. today and Friday. Students who purchased football tickets last spring can pick them up by presenting their student identification cards and ticket receipts.

All new students and those who did not purchase tickets in the spring will be seated in the North or South Stadiums.

KU opener to test Big 8 dominance

When the University of Kansas (KU) Jayhawks open their 1976 season Saturday in Corvallis, Ore., again Oregon State University, it could mark the beginn ng of another season which Big 8 Conference football teams lominate those from other conferences.

Last season, Big 8 schools posted a 29-7 mark against non-conference opposition, despite winning only one of four post-season contests. The 29-7 mark translates into ig percentage of nearly 81 per cent, a hig 8 record. a winni

In the last five years, the record has been equally im-pressive. Beginning with the 1971 season, the Hig 8 has posted successive marks of 28-8-1, 25-12, 27-7-1, 23-11 and 29-9 against non-conference opposition

The Big 8 has fared best in games against schools from the Missouri Valley Conference, winning all 12 games between the two conferences in the last five years.


The only major conference the Big 8 has failed to domrate in recent years is the Southeastern Conference. The Big 8 five-year mark against SEC opponents is only 10-9. Big 8 schools were victorious in all three games between the two conferences last year however, including the University of Missouri's (MU) stunning 20-7 nationally televised upset of Alabama in MU's opener.

Other nujor conferences and the Big 8's mark against them are: Big 10, 16-5; Southwest, 23-10-1; Pacific 8, 14-6-1; Atlantic Coast, 6-1; Western Athletic Conference, 14-4; major independents, 29-8 and others, 7-2.

The University of Oklahoma (OU) Sooners lead the Big 8 in non-conference winning percentage with a 22-0-1 record. The Huskers are second at 23-3 and the University of Colorado (CU) is third with an 18-5 mark.

Other Big 8 schools and their non-conference records are: Kansas State University, 14-6; Oklahoma State University, 14-6-1; Iowa State University and MU, 14-8 and KU 13-9.

Missouri appears to have the toughest non-conference schedule in the Big 8 this year, facing the University of Southern California and Ohio State University on the road and hosting the universities of Illinois and North Carolina,

Final tryouts for the UNL women's volleyball team are at 3:30 p.m. today and Friday in WPE 313.




