Quake rocks Italy

Udine, Italy—Strong tremors jolted the quake-ravaged Friuli area again Wednesday, knocking down hundreds of buildings and spreading new fear through a land that has been shaking for more than four months. At least eight persons were reported dead, three of them from heart attacks. About 80 persons were injured, many of them from jumping out of windows. Rescue teams started digging through land and rock slides that reportedly buried several cars and two army trucks, possibly with people trapped inside. Twenty-one tremors were registered in an eight-hour period starting at 5:22 a.m. Two of the predawn jolts and one before noon surpassed six points on the Richter scale, approaching the strength of those that killed nearly 1,000 persons in Friuli on May 6. Since May, 241 tremors have been recorded.

Wife dismayed

San Francisco—Roaslynn Carter says she is sorry abortion has become the number one issue she is asked about on the campaign trail. The 49-year-old wife of Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter says she is asked her opinion on abortion "over and over." Mrs. Carter said, "I am sorry it has become the main issue in the campaign because there are so many things that are so important."

Grant okayed

Grand Island—The Community Development Agency Advisory Board has conditionally approved a \$200,000 grant for the Grand Generation Board of Trustees. Grand Generation is trying to acquire enough funds to construct a new senior citizens center here. The approval of the grant is conditioned on Grand Generation's ability to raise enough money for the construction by the end of the year. The new center will cost an estimated \$290,000, and Grand Generation officials said they have raised only about \$13,000.

Forum scheduled

Omaha—The League of Women Voters of Omaha has asked that candidates for the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives discuss the issues of the campaign in a public forum. The League said Senate candidates John Y. McCollister, a Republican, and Edward Zorinsky, a Democrat, have been asked to meet on Oct. 20. Second District Congressional candidates John Cavanaugh, a Democrat, and Lee Terry, a Republican, have been asked to meet Oct. 27.

A League spokesperson said the candidates have not yet responded to the invitations.

Terry gets funds

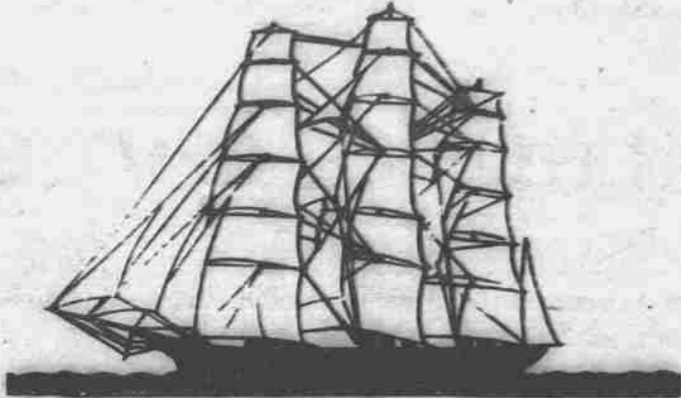
Lee Terry of Omaha received \$1,000 from the National Republican Committee for his drive to win the Congressional District seat. Terry was the only Nebraska recipient of national funds in the committee's report filed with the secretary of state's office Wednesday. Terry and State Sen. John Cavanaugh of Omaha, a Democrat, are battling for the seat being vacated by Rep. John Y. McCollister.

Union formed

The Nebraska Association of Public Employees has won an election making it the exclusive bargaining agent for non-supervisory workers in the State Department of Roads, NAPE Executive Director Roger Schulz said Wednesday. The Nebraska Court of Industrial Relations confirmed that NAPE had won a run-off election with the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees to represent department maintenance workers. In July, NAPE won the right to represent construction, clerical and technical workers. In that same election, maintenance workers did not give AFSCME or NAPE enough votes to claim bargaining agent rights.

Program repeats

The Nebraska Educational Television Network will repeat its special program stressing ways to conserve energy in town or on the farm. The half hour program, entitled *Saving Home Energy* and featuring Gov. J. J. Exon, will be repeated at 6:30 p.m. Saturday and again at 10 p.m. Sept. 27.



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
