A San Francisco palm has been transplanted in Lincoln to give residents a variety in cuisine.

With its name taken from a San Francisco bar, the Palms Cafe, 235 N. 11th St., could easily be the most interesting restaurant in Lincoln. It is the only restaurant offering brews from an Italian expresso machine, fruits, vegetables and bread, purchased and prepared daily, atmosphere with a 20s and 30s flair, a vegetarian menu and a tea time scheduled every afternoon.

Over the noon hour, a European custom is practiced by willing diners.

The cafe is a branch of Dirt Cheap Enterprises. According to owner Terry Moore, "The idea of a restaurant came about because of the fact that Lincoln has such a slim selection of types of places to eat. We figured that a vegetarian restaurant was unusual and that there was a need for

The building was purchased in February 1975. After seven months of stripping the inside of the building and refurbishing it, the Palms was ready for business.



The Palms Cafe is open Monday through Saturday, 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. Lunch is served from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., tea time is from 3 to 5 p.m., and dinner is from 5 to 9 p.m.

The menu accommodates a variety of tastes. There are daily soups and specials, entrees ranging from fried rice to salads, nibblers and side dishes.

Sandwiches from the standard peanut butter and jelly to the avocado deluxe are available, likewise salads and deserts.
