Murphey-Lang.

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It's difficult to describe, however, the style of one without drawing comparisons with the others.

All incorporated traditional American folk influences, bottle-neck and open tunings into their styles.

Lang has cleanness

Lang incorporates a cleanness in his sound. He shines on clarity and speed, and is not afraid to let his classical influence come through.

Murphey's biography seems complete in comparison to Lang's

Unfortunately, he is best known for the well-produced and well-received single, Wildfire.

It's unfortunate because it dwarfs some of his earlier. and in many ways, finer works.

Murphey is a native Texan, but now calls Colorado home.

Steeped in heritage

He is steeped in his heritage and roots. His songs do not take the shape of the banality often associated with artists such as John Denver.

Instead, he transforms them into strong, mood statements. Lyrically, Murphey never has been strong, although his latest work is moving in that direction.

In probably his finest song to date, Geronimo's Cadillac, Murphey's strong feeling for mood and simplicity comes across in a power play so full of irony and gentle force that it serves as a good example of what Murphey's capabilities are, and they are formidable.

Murphey's concern for the American Indian is obvious in his work, but Cadillac serves as his definitive statement.

The years of broken treaties and sad reservations are caught up in the Geronimo story. Held in prison until he was an old man. Geronimo was released by the government when it became apparent there was no earthly reason to hold him,

They gave him a car when he got out of jail.


Murphey's song is haunting in its simplicity. The chorus goes, "Oh lord, take me back, I want to ride in Geronimo's Cadillac. . .'

The power and the sadness serve as a good example of the Murphey vision.

Murphey is acoustic, mellow and powerful without the loss of a sense of humor.

His control and understanding of moods are his major attribute.
