Chief of staff

St. Simons Island, Ga.—Jimmy Carter has ruled out naming a single, all-powerful chief of staff, said Jody Powell, Carter's press secretary. The best-known recent staff chief was H.R. Haldeman, former President Nixon's right-hand man. Even Cabinet officers had to go through Haldeman when they sought access to Nixon. Powell said that is not Carter's style and is not the way he ran his office when he was governor of Georgia or his campaign for president. He said Carter is likely to opt for a "spokes of the wheel" approach, similar to that used by President John F. Kennedy, who allowed six or seven top aides equal access to the President.

Patty moved

San Diego—Patricia Hearst was moved from a spacious federal prison in Northern California to a 12-story facility here at her own request for security reasons, officials say. Miss Hearst, 22, who is serving a seven-year sentence for armed bank robbery, was driven to the Metropolitan Correctional Center here on Tuesday from the campus-like Federal Correctional Institution in Pleasanton, east of San Francisco.

Firing squad

Salt Lake City—Condemned killer Gary Mark Gilmore renewed his request in person to the Utah Supreme Court Wednesday to withdraw a stay of execution so he can be shot by a firing squad next Monday. Deputy Warden Leon Hatch of the Utah State Prison said Gilmore would be escorted to a court hearing Wednesday at the State Capitol. He said two court-appointed

lawyers who sought the stay against Gilmore's wishes would also appear, as would a California lawyer engaged to represent the convict in his fight to die. Gilmore, 35, was convicted of first-degree murder in the death of a Provo motel clerk. No one has been executed in the United States since 1967.

Honor code

West Point, N.Y.—West Point cadets have voted to abolish a review board of officers and instead try alleged violators of the honor code themselves. The new system was approved in a referendum Tuesday night by 85 per cent of the 4,044-cadet corps, according to Michael Ivy, chairman of the cadet honor committee. The referendum, which the honor committee had been drafting since late August, takes effect immediately.
