Peace signals

United Nations, N.Y.—A flurry of peace signals from the Arabs and Israel flagged hopes for a Mideast settlement as the United Nations took up the problem once more Thursday. But observers say the name of the game is "waiting for Jimmy Carter." U.N. sources said the Arabs were readying Mideast settlement proposals for the General Assembly that are much less abrasive than resolutions of recent years, when the primary Arab goal was to isolate and attack Israel. Statements in recent weeks by leaders of Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Syria and the Palestine Liberation Organization, as well as by Israel, the United States and the Soviet Union, have raised strong expecta-

tions that 1977 will see a serious new effort for a Mideast settlement.

Klan in the Corps

Oceanside, Calif.-More than 50 Marines at Camp Pendleton, the scene of racial violence last month, are members of the Ku Klux Klan, and others belong to different white supremacist groups, a former Klan offi-cial says. Marine Sgt. Randall Clouse, 24, who said he once was "Exalted Cyclops" of the Klan in nearby Oceanside, refused to give precise figures on Klan membership at the base, but said it was over 50. There are 32,000 Marines at Camp Pendleton. Clouse, reassigned to Dallas earlier in the week, commented in an interview with the Los Angeles Times. Clouse said in the interview, given before his transfer, that the KKK chapter at Camp Pendleton was formed "because we're just a little bit upset at the way things are being done." He said, as an example, blacks can play "soul" music on the jukebox at the enlisted men's club, but if whites tried to play country and western songs, blacks "would bounce on the jukebox so it wouldn't play, unplug it or turn it down."

Bombers

Frankfurt, West Germany—An anti-American group has claimed it planted a bomb in the Officers Club at the sprawling Rhein-Main U.S. Air Force Base where several persons were injured in a fire Wednesday. Police Thursday studied letters mailed to news agencies including The Associated Press that identified the group by the name Revolutionary Cells and said a bomb was planted as part of an "anti-imperalist battle." The letter the AP received was similar to one sent last June after two time bombs shattered a U.S. Army shopping center in Frankfurt, injuring 16. On Wednesday, a fire gutted the wooden building containing the officers' mess at the air base and resulted in two persons being hospitalized for observation.

Agenda includes criteria changes


Whether the criteria for graduate faculty membership should be changed will be discussed Monday at the first graduate faculty meeting since Henry Holtzclaw became dean of graduate studies Sept. 1.

Holtzclaw said graduate faculty members agree that the statement requiring a nominee to have evidence of active participation in a research program should temain. But he said there is a question as to what constitutes evidence.


The statement needs to be more specific, he said. One proposal being considered would be to require each nominee to be actively involved in graduate research and/or teaching as a part of their regular duties.


