

ASUN GENERAL ELECTION

MARCH 16, 1977

VOTING

Students may vote at any of the following:
City Union 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.
Nebraska Hall 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.
East Union 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS—Students who will not be in Lincoln, Nebraska, during the time the polls are open because they are on an officially recognized University trip may by stating the official function on a form supplied by the ASUN secretary and having their signature notarized by 4:00 p.m. on the Friday before the election will be permitted to vote by absentee ballot.

DISABLED BALLOTS—Disabled shall mean unable to attend class due to confinement to Student Health or a hospital. Students so disabled shall call the ASUN secretary before noon of election day. A ballot will be brought to the student for voting before 9:00 p.m. on election day.

VOTING REGULATIONS

Each student must present his own I.D. card when he votes. The act of giving the I.D. to the poll worker is the attempt to vote. No student shall vote or attempt to vote more than once in any election, nor shall any student aid such an attempt.

ASUN CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE ADDED TO THE GENERAL ELECTION BALLOT ON 16 MARCH 1977:

AMENDMENT 1
Add to Article IV, Section 1, dealing with the "Powers Relating to Organizations" the following amendment:

D. To have final approval of the allocation of Student Fees to Student Organizations, without which such funds shall neither be collected nor dispersed.

AMENDMENT 2

Change Article VI, Section D, dealing with the Electoral Commission Powers, from:

D. Duties. The duties of the Electoral Commission shall be:

- To announce filings and schedule election dates for all elections conducted by the Association.
- To publicize the dates and procedures for filing and elections, and to issue at the request of candidates advisory opinions as to the legality of proposed methods in election campaigns.
- To establish polling places and to supervise the balloting at each polling place, either in person or through agents authorized and announced by the Commission one week prior to the election.
- To tabulate the ballots, with at least three Commissioners being present and at least one of them being a faculty representative.
- To seal the ballots, tabulations and computations and deliver them to the senior faculty representative for safe-keeping for a thirty (30) day period.
- To announce the complete results of the election to the press, including the number of votes cast for each candidate, and to be prepared, upon request, to issue a break-down of Presidential votes and votes cast on amendments and referenda by colleges.

To: D. Duties. The duties of the Electoral Commission shall be to carry on the following functions with the advice and consent of the Senate. (Points 1-6 remain the same.)

AMENDMENT 3

Change Article VII, Section 4, Paragraph C, dealing with Recall vote, from:

C. Recall.

- By a petition signed by thirty-five (35) percent of all the regularly enrolled full-time students enrolled in a college to require the Electoral Commission to schedule and conduct within fifteen (15) class days a special election for the Senate seat in question in that college by the final apportionment at the Spring general election.
- By a petition signed by thirty-five (35) percent of all the regularly enrolled full-time students of the entire University, to require the Electoral Commission to schedule and conduct within fifteen (15) class days a special election for the Presidency, or First and Second Vice Presidency of the Association.

To: C. Recall.

- By a petition signed by Twenty-five (25) percent of all regularly enrolled full-time students enrolled in a college to require the Electoral Commission to schedule and conduct within fifteen (15) class days a Special Election for the Senate seat in question in that college by the final apportionment at the Spring general election.
- By a petition signed by twenty-five (25) percent of all regularly enrolled full-time students of the entire University, to require the Electoral Commission to schedule and conduct within fifteen (15) class days a special election for the Presidency and/or First and Second Vice Presidency of the Association.

AMENDMENT 4
—YES —NO
Change Article X, Section 5, dealing with Constitutional Conventions, from:

A. A call for a Constitutional Convention may be originated by:

- A majority vote of three-fourths (¾) of all elected members of the Senate.
- A petition submitted to the Senate, signed by not less than thirty-five (35) percent of the regularly-enrolled, full-time students of the University of Nebraska. Signatures must be submitted with University identification numbers and shall be validated by the Electoral Commission.

To: A. A call for a Constitutional Convention may be originated by:

- A majority vote of three-fourths (¾) of the membership of the Senate are recognized by the chair.
- A petition submitted to the Senate signed by not less than fifteen (15) percent of the regularly enrolled, full-time students of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Signatures must be submitted with University identification numbers and shall be validated by the Electoral Commission.

AMENDMENT 5
—YES —NO
Change Article X, Section 4, dealing with vote required for the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 4. Vote Required.

The amendment shall be ratified:

- By a majority vote with at least thirty (30) percent of the eligible students voting in the election, or
- By an affirmative vote of fifteen (15) percent of the eligible voters when less than thirty (30) percent of the eligible students vote.

To: Section 4. Vote Required.

The amendment shall be ratified:

- By a majority vote with at least fifteen (15) percent of the eligible students voting in the election, or
- By an affirmative vote of seven and one-half (7.5) percent of the eligible voters when less than fifteen (15) percent of the eligible students vote.

AMENDMENT 6
—YES —NO
Add to Article IX, Section 1, dealing with Senate Meetings, the following:

A quorum shall be defined as two-thirds (2/3) of the membership of the Senate as recognized by the chair. This definition supersedes all other definitions of a quorum contained in this Constitution.
