## NU budget heading for next stop on road to approval

NU's appropriations bill will be introduced in the Nebraska Legislature Tuesday and senators are expected to discuss it sometime during the week of April 18 according to Waverly Sen. Jerome Warner, appropriations committee chairman.

The committee has adjusted its original recommendation of \$100.4 million to about \$100.6 million Warner said. This is about \$11 million below the NU Board of Regents request but close to Gov. J. James Exon's latest suggestion that NU receive \$100.8 million.

Warner said the committee allotted funds by priority needs and "didn't pay attention to what the governor said." Predicting few adjustments to the bill during floor debate, he said "there isn't room for very many" changes.

"There is no money and it's hard to spend what you

don't have," he added.

UNL comptroller Robert Lovitt described the differences between the regents' requests and the committee's recommendations and warned these sums still are liable to change before the NU budget bill passes.

Areas of Excellence The regents requested some \$116,000 but about \$275,000 was allocated for the Area of Excellence programs. Warner said the committee matched the Regents' request in this area except for the art and music departments, which requested more than the regents asked for.

These funds are a continuation of existing programs involving six UNL and three University of Nebraska at Omaha departments designated Areas of Excellence.

Lovitt said the committee recommended \$129,000 for the State University of Nebraska (SUN), which is the sum currently appropriated for that program. About \$179,000 had been requested.

The committee recommended about \$522,000 for selective areas of improvement although NU requested about \$810,000, he said.

One of these areas is the establishment of a small business management course at UNL. About \$30,000 has been recommended for this program, which was prompted by UNL senior Bill Jackson's request to the Legislature. A total of \$50,000 has been allocated for innovative

undergraduate improvement at UNL. Lovitt said NU officials "haven't gotten exactly what this means" yet. He said this sum goes beyone the so-called Bereuter funds for improvement of undergraduate education allocated last year.

Recommendations

The committee recommended NU receive its requests of \$75,000 for the College of Dentistry, \$120,000 for women's athletics, \$42,000 for graduate studies and research and \$20,000 for affirmative action. Affirmative

action programs are to enable NU to comply with federal laws, Lovitt said.

Included in the committee's recommended extra operating costs is \$110,000 for the library system. Some \$371,000 of operating expenses have been recommended for the maintenance of new buildings such as the Life Science Bldg. and the Nebraska East Union.

The committee met the regents' requested 5 per cent

inflationary budget for other operating costs.

The requested 5.5 per cent increase for faculty and administrative salaries was recommended. The committee also suggested the salaries of full-time clerical and graduate student employees be boosted 3 per cent plus \$240.

NU employees paid lower salaries will receive a higher percentage of increased pay, Lovitt said.
