Hayakawa: scrap energy plan

Califormia Sen. Samuel I. Hayakawa said Friday the "forces of the marketplace" are capable of solving energy problems and that a federal energy program is not necessary.
Hayakawa appeared in Lincoln at the request of Sen. Carl Curtis, who endorsed Vance Rogers' gubernatorial candidacy Friday

The Senate "loused up President Carter's energy program to the salvation of the American people," Hayakawa told fund-raising dinner for Rogers, a Repub lican.

Hayakawa said that given the success of an unregulated agricultural market in distributing food products, he sees no need for federal intervention in the energy market.
Hayakawa gut in the national spotlight when he put down a student rebellion as president of San Francisco State College in the late 1960s.
over an incumbent Democrat in 1976 .

Hayakawa said he is "delighted" to support the Rogers candidacy, who, like him, is a reformed college president."
At the news conference Hayakawa also criticized a federal court decision also limited the size of farms getting water from federally financed irrigation projects to 160 acres.

In that decision the court showed hostility toward bigness in farming, Hayakawa said. Good, efficient farms grow larger than 160 acres, he said. He alse said the return of the crown of St. Stephen to Hungary angers him. The crown and sceptre were captured

The return of the symbols of Hungarian national sovereignty "legitimatizes the communist tyranny in Hungary," Hayakawa said.

Hayakawa told the audience at the dinner that teenagers are being discriminated against by minimum wage laws.

He also cited Athenian medieval history to say that businessmen are the true social revolutionaries.
"We will get to a classless society faster than the Soviet Union," Hayakawa said.
