UNL-MU match is a toss up in Big Eight tournament



UNL center Carl McPike, shown here in Tuesday night's game against Oklahoma State, was named the All-District 5 basketball team Wednesday by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association. McPike will take his 15.6 scoring average to Kansas City's Kemper Arena tonight at 7:05 against the University of Missouri in Big Eight semifinal playoff action.

UNL basketball coach Joe Cipriano will take his most victorious team against the Missouri Tigers in the semifinals of the Big Eight Conference Tournament in Kansas City, Friday.

Friday's UNL-MU matchup will be between two teams each having won one of the previous meetings this year.

UNL, 21-6 on the season and 9-5 in Big Eight play, defeated the Tigers 56-55 in Lincoln, however MU, 12-15 on the year and 4-10 in conference play, walloped UNL 74-52 in Columbia.

"The papers called Missouri's win at Iowa State an upset, but it really didn't surprise me, because when Missouri is on, they can play with anybody," Cipriano said. "They proved that by beating us by 22 points at Columbia."

"I hope that game is on our minds and that revenge is in our eyes. We know what Missouri can do to us, so we'll just have to be more ready this time than the last."

UNL's chances to make NCAA or National Invitational Tournament ride on the outcome of the Big Eight Tournament.

The only way the Tigers can advance to tournament action is to win the Big Eight Tournament. The tournament winner advances to the NCAA first-round games at Wichita, Kan.

"The postseason tourney looks good to us this year because it gives us something to shoot for at this point in the year," Tiger Coach Norm Stewart said. "Even though we haven't had a great deal of success the last few weeks, this gives us a chance to turn things around."

The Tigers have won only three of their last 10 games.

"We've discovered that we are not a team that is able to make a large number of turnovers or have a poor shot selection and still win basketball games," Stewart said.

MU is led by senior forward Clay Johnson averaging more than 16 points and seven rebounds a game.

Other Tiger starters include Brad Droy, averaging 11.8 points at forward, center Stan Ray, guards Larry Drew, averaging 12.8 points and Jeff Currie.

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The UNI men's gymnastics squad will face the number two-ranked team in the nation, Louisiana State University, tonight at Baton Rouge.

UNI, 3-5 for the season, has faced three top-10 teams in the nation in the last five weeks. UNI lost to number one-rated Oklahoma University and suffered losses to Iowa State University and Southern Illinois University, both rated in the top 10.

Against Southern Illinois, UNI was led by freshman all-rounder Barry Cook who scored career highs in the floor exercises and the still rings.

After the Iowa State dual, the Huskers will prepare for the Big Eight Gymnastics Championships at the Sports Complex, Saturday at 10 a.m.

The UNI women's tennis team, which defeated Kansas State University last weekend, will host Iowa University and Creighton University at the Sports Complex, Saturday at 10 a.m.

The defending Big Eight Champion,

which have a 1-0 dual record, are led by Joyce McVicker and Sue Sloboth who won their doubles match last weekend.

After being named to the United Press International All-Big Eight first team, UNI guard Brian Banks was placed on the second team of the Associated Press' All-Big Eight basketball team.

Teammate Carl McPike, who received honorable mention on the UPI team, was named to the All-District 5 basketball team selected by the U.S. sportswriters.
