Storm sewers built to correct leaking tunnels

Barricades, storm sewer pipes and open trenches will grace the UNL campus until the end of May, according to UNL Physical Plant spokesman.

The sidewalks on the southeast corner of Love Library lawn have been torn up, ditches dug and work is being done to improve drainage of rain water, said Tom Nycum, assistant director of the physical plant. The estimated cost is \$9,400.

Harley Schrader, physical plant director, said that last fall, water began to leak into a steam tunnel that serves the Nebraska Union, the Administration building and the State Capitol. Schrader said a storm sewer is being installed to divert drainage water and correct the problem.

Schrader explained that the storm sewer will run into a curb inlet as it carries water underground.

"We didn't know this was a problem area until the steam tunnel began to leak," Schrader said, adding that new grass planted in the area last year may have cause additional standing water.

"We know this has been a problem area for several years. We're just getting to it," Nycum said.

"We are constantly trying to update our drainage system," Nycum said. Work will be complete by the end of May, if weather permits, he added.

"The only alternative to this work was to waterproof the entire steam tunnel," Schrader said.

Incomes to increase

Washington - The combined personal income of all Americans rose 1.2 percent in March, the biggest increase in three months, the Commerce Department said Tuesday.

An increase in personal income is a good sign for business activity because it means more money is available to spend on retail goods and investments. That, in turn, can lead to more jobs. Most of the increase was in wages and salaries, which reflected a recovery from effects of the severe winter, the department said.

The gain in March followed a 1.3 percent increase in December and increases of only 0.2 percent in January and 0.5 per-

cent in February.
