The Nebraska Repertory Theatre schedule also includes "Sherlock Holmes" on July 1.

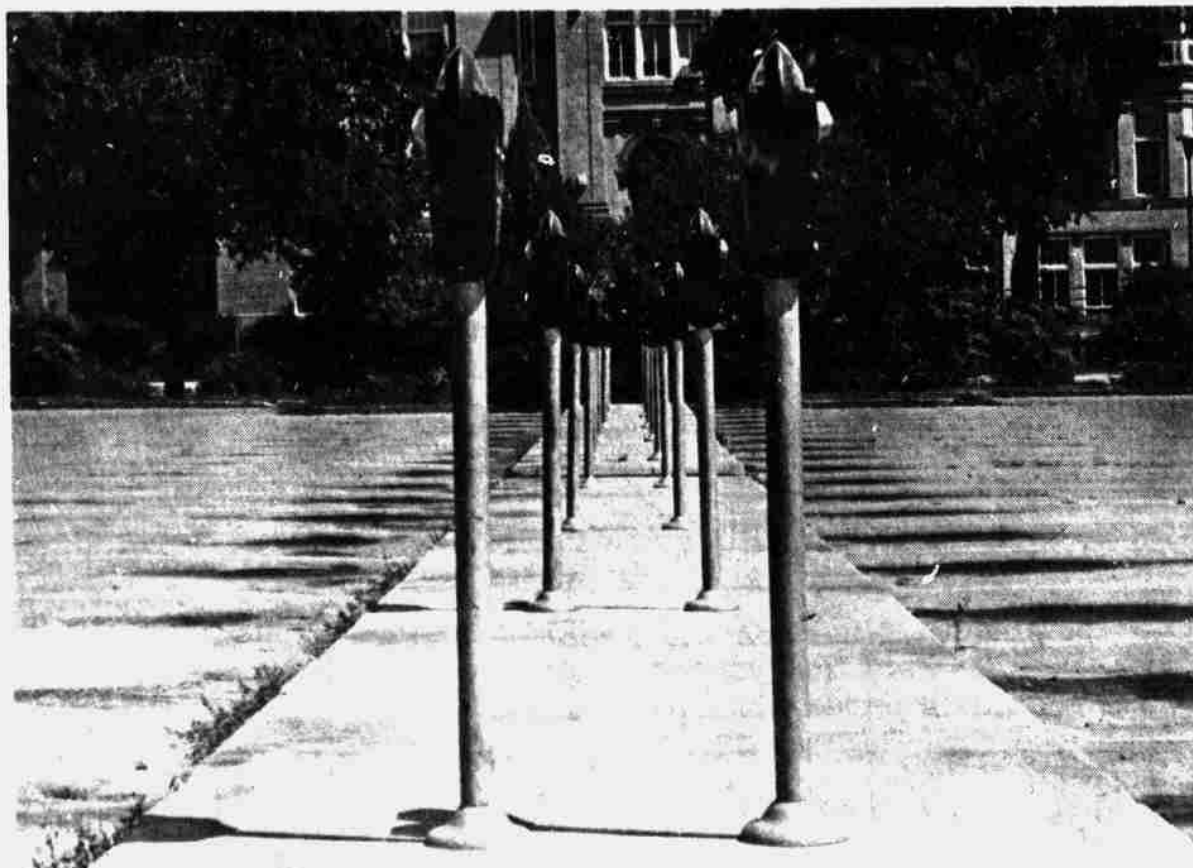
Planetarium presents 'Cosmic Concerts'
