

Marienu recommends CSL focus on university concerns

ASUN President Ken Marienu, addressing an informal meeting of the Council on Student Life (CSL), told the members that CSL's function should be to deal with university wide issues, not student issues. "The role (of CSL) might be more widespread in the area of campus life, more than student life," he said.

Marienu said that when ASUN decided to recall university committees, CSL was originally to have been left out of the action for two reasons.

The first reason, he said, was that CSL is a part of campus by-laws, and the second reason was that students make up a majority of CSL's members. But, he said, that because of its importance, CSL was included in the recalling action.

CSL Student Affairs member Janet Krause said, "I view this action with dismay . . . CSL allows a middle ground, it is not a vested interest. It would be tragic if we mess around with this beautiful open forum."

Marienu said in reply that while he thought it was "vitaly important to have a group where faculty, students and staff can get together," that "there has been contro-

The runners left this morning in five vans from the TKE house and hope to complete the 225-mile relay at the Iowa State University TKE house at 11 a.m. Saturday.

The fraternity hopes to raise \$2,500 for the hospital, which is the only research center dedicated exclusively to curing childhood cancer and other deadly children's diseases.

versy from its (CSL's) inception, mainly regarding the gray areas—who hears what, where and when."

Marienu said that of the proposals regarding CSL's function, he favored the alternative that read "Change (CSL) powers to policy recommending on matters of mutual interest sent to it by ASUN or the Faculty Senate."

He said that CSL would still have "policy recommending powers to the chancellor, as it does now" but it would be on university, not student concerns.

CSL member Larry Williams said that he felt ASUN was going too fast. "If you're going to undertake something like this, it should be done on a slow, methodical basis," he said. He said he felt there was "too much overlap between ASUN and CSL," and suggested that CSL should be "under ASUN's wing."
