

# Lady Huskers hang onto tie, though team not in full suit

The Nebraska women's gymnastic team ended its 1979 home season by tying 16th-ranked Louisiana State University Friday night at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

This was the second time this season the Lady Huskers tied. Each team scored 132.25 points. Earlier this season a meet between Nebraska and Minnesota ended in a deadlock.

Both coaches said they would have won the meet if their top all-arounder had not been injured.

Neither team was at full strength. Nebraska performed without one of their top all-arounders, freshman Renee Reisdorff, while all-arounder Patty Carmichael performed with an injured ankle.

LSU was without their top all-arounder Jeanne Beedle, who was out with a knee injury.

NU coach Judy Schalk said the Huskers would have won easily with Reisdorff.

"There's no one close to her on the (balance) beam or the floor (exercise)," Schalk said.

"I kept her out of this meet so she'll be ready for regionals," she said.

### Coches 'disgusted'

D.D. Breaux, LSU head coach, said the Tigers would have beaten Nebraska if Beedle would have performed.

She said she was disgusted with the way the meet turned out.

"The judges helped Nebraska tie us," Breaux said. "Both teams were severely underscored. We got no credit for doing clean work," she added.

Without Beedle, LSU's top all-arounder was Jamie Middleton, who finished third with a score of 33.50. Nebraska's Patty Carmichael finished first and Peggy Liddick placed second.

Husker coach Shalk said LSU was the toughest team Nebraska has faced in a dual meet this season. She said LSU put a better team on the floor but the difference was Nebraska's ability to make more of their tougher skills than LSU.

Several of the Husker women said there was no comparison between the two teams Nebraska tied this year.

Karen Madsen, who competed as an all-arounder for the first time since December, said that LSU was a much better team than Minnesota.

### 'Improved' team

"We've come a long way since the Minnesota meet," Madsen said. "We're a much improved team."

The Lincoln freshman said she will perform on the uneven bars and the floor exercise at the regional meet.

The Huskers finished first in all four events with senior Peggy Liddick and sophomore Patty Carmichael winning two events each.

Carmichael finished with a 34.65 score. She won the floor exercise and the uneven bars. Her 9.20 score in the floor

exercise—the final event of the night—helped to gain the tie for the Nebraska women. Carmichael scored 8.55 in the uneven bars.

"I think we did exceptionally well without Renee (Reisdorff)," Carmichael said. "We were really pleased with a 132."

She said she is looking forward to the regional meet in two weeks.

"We have to win our region to go to nationals," Carmichael said. "We're getting better all the time and with Renee we'll really be tough to beat."

Liddick, who finished second to Car-

michael in the all-around with a 34.30 score, won the vault and the balance beam with 9.25 and 8.60 scores, respectively.

She said Nebraska would have had five more points on LSU if Reisdorff would have competed.

Liddick also said the Huskers are favored to win their regional meet in Ames, Ia. on March 16-17.

"If everybody's healthy and we do just like we've been doing, we'll win it," Liddick said. "I'd love to go to nationals," she said. "We've gone through a lot of hard times together so I hope we make it."

also set a Nebraska record in the 100 backstroke and swam a leg on each of the 400 and 800 freestyle relays that set records during the meet.

Freshman Steve Elliott squeaked out Nebraska's third individual championship with a one-point win over Kansas' Tom Anagnos in the three-meter diving.

Elliott, also a member of Nebraska's gymnastics squad, ignored an ankle injury suffered two weeks ago while warming up for a gymnastics match with Oklahoma to nail down the diving win.

Along with Douglass, 1976 Swedish Olympic team member Anders Rutqvist

planted his name in the Nebraska record book four times during the meet.

Rutqvist set marks in the 200 and 500 freestyle races while joining Douglass on the two record-setting Nebraska relay teams.

The Huskers' Gary Peters established two records in one event, the 1,650 freestyle. Besides setting a new mark for the race itself, Peters' split time for the first 1,000 yards also set a Husker record.

Other Nebraska records included Dick Conradt, 200 individual medley; Mark Crowder, 50 freestyle and 100 butterfly; Jerry Olaszewski, 400 individual medley; and Goran Westerlund, 200 butterfly.

## Workshop plans cost analysis

A workshop to plan the requested \$3.07 million remodeling of UNL's Agricultural Engineering building provided initial cost estimates and opportunity for an exercise in life cycle cost analysis, now required on state buildings.

Legislation passed in April 1978 requires life cycle cost analysis after preliminary plans are developed for all state projects totaling more than \$50,000.

Cycle cost analysis is a method to determine building, operating and maintenance costs on structures' life span.

The Agricultural Engineering building is the first university building to come under this law.

Harley Schrader, director of UNL Physical Plant Administration, said life cycle cost analysis is a "good philosophy" and a fine way to appropriate costs for the building's life span.

In the past, designers have not always

constructed buildings that were economical to maintain over a period of years, Schrader said. Rather, designers would look at comparable buildings and estimate unit escalating cost on the basis of the number of square feet.

This method will only give initial building costs, he added.

He estimated the cost for the Agricultural Engineering building to be between \$3.5 and 4 million under the life cycle cost analysis.

William Splinter, head of the Agricultural Engineering Department said the university has requested \$3.07 million and the governor has requested \$2.74 million for the remodeling, which was probably based on the initial request two years ago.

Splinter said the appropriation committee has not decided on the final amount and the university will meet with the committee about the request.
