

Israeli Cabinet accepts two Carter compromises

Jerusalem—The Israeli Cabinet Wednesday accepted President Carter's two key compromises to pave the way for an Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty, but postponed until Sunday its final decision on approving the treaty as a whole.

At the same time, the Israeli state radio said the Cabinet ordered Defense Minister Ezer Weizman to go to Washington to discuss U.S. aid and political commitments to Israel.

The radio said Weizman would fly to Washington Thursday carrying draft proposals for American guarantees of financial and oil supplies.

The cabinet was to meet again Sunday when Weizman

returned and would review and act on the final draft of the treaty, the radio said.

Prime Minister Menachem Begin told reporters that he telephoned Carter with the news immediately after the cabinet session, adding that "the President was very glad to receive this information."

In Washington, Carter said "all the outstanding issues" between Egypt and Israel "have now been successfully resolved."

Chinese plane crashes

Tokyo—A British-built trident aircraft crashed into a

factory on the outskirts of Peking Wednesday and about 200 persons were feared killed, the Japanese news service Kyodo reported.

The dispatch from the Chinese capital quoted witnesses as saying the aircraft with 12 crew members and passengers aboard hit the factory near Peking airport at 8:52 a.m. (6:52 p.m. CST Tuesday) shortly after takeoff.

All passengers and crew aboard the plane were believed killed.

Other victims included workers from an assembly plant, the news service said.

One of the witnesses, a Western correspondent, said saw many Chinese soldiers engaged in rescue work late into the night. He said debris from the wreckage was scattered over a large area, according to the Kyodo report.

No official confirmation was available from the Chinese authorities, it said.

Kyodo noted that Trident aircraft often are used in China to transport government leaders and other high ranking officials.

Earthquake in Mexico

Mexico City—A severe earthquake and 18 aftershocks rocked this city for four hours Wednesday, damaging buildings and spraying broken glass over downtown streets. The Red Cross said a 14-year-old girl was killed and 21 persons were injured.

A three-story building collapsed at Ibero-American University, a private institute to the southern part of the city. Most of the windows at the university were broken.

Police said many private homes were heavily damaged. But life quickly returned to normal and traffic filled the streets during the morning rush hour.

The Seismological Institute in Mexico City reported the quake measured 7 on the Richter scale and the epicenter was 198 miles southwest of the capital city.
