He said the regents approved one payment of \$9,000 after Gourlay found out. The money had been paid through a complex transfer of funds.

Eppley, Koeft said, has a self-generated fund. Part of that money would be transferred to the NU Foundation, which transferred the money to the Medical Center, which wrote a check for the legal services.

Koeft said \$32,000 had been paid in that way before the regents found out about it.

Burrows commented that he did not understand the reason.

On the question of free veterinary and diagnostic testing at East Campus, Koeft said the regents dealt with the matter at a May 20, 1978 meeting, and decided on a fee structure that would correct problems mentioned in Prokop's letter.

Burrows said he hoped that matter could be resolved through discussion and would not have to be included in study resolution.

Burrows said he would like to study the possibility of conflicts of interest that could be created by consultancies held by professors involved in research. The possibility that a researcher could be paid by a firm involved in his research is worth studying, Burrows said.

"Both of you (Prokop and Koeft) have spoken with us in good faith, and evidently one of you is wrong," Burrows told Koeft.

Koeft said that Prokop is "opposed to most things accomplished at the board level." Koeft said he prefers to go with the majority decision.

Regents to meet Saturday

The NU Board of Regents will decide whether to increase student fees, effective September 1979, by \$2.50 per student at their Saturday meeting.

This would mean student fees would increase from \$66.50 to \$69 a semester.

The formal meeting will start at 1:30 p.m., with the Academic Affairs and Business subcommittees meeting in the morning.

The regents will also consider a \$3 per year increase in student fees at the Medical Center. The additional funds would be given to the Med Center Student Senate.
