The median salary for deans of colleges of arts and sciences was \$34,008. UNL Arts and Sciences Dean Max Larsen makes \$43,100 a year, while his counterpart at the University of Oklahoma earns \$46,000.

The dean at Missouri makes \$52,500; at Kansas, \$47,300; at Kansas State, \$46,020; at Colorado, \$48,500. The dean of Sciences and Humanities at Iowa State is paid \$51,200.

The Chronicle of Higher Education reported that the median salary for athletic directors is \$26,364, compared to Bob Devaney's \$45,700.

However, Oklahoma's athletic director is paid \$38,300. The Kansas State athletic

director gets \$45,060. The same job pays \$43,000 at Colorado. Missouri's athletic director is paid \$42,000 and the job pays \$41,000 at Iowa State.

The national median for an executive vice president at a university system is \$37,290. NU Executive Vice President for Administration William Erskine is paid \$39,600. His counterpart at Missouri is paid \$56,200. At Kansas State, the vice president is paid \$51,960. The job pays \$45,000 at Colorado, and at Kansas, \$47,818.

UNL affirmative action officer Bradley Munn was the only administrator whose salary was below the national median.
