Snow fight brings arrests

Ten UNL students were arrested and charged with disturbing the peace while participating in a snowball fight Wednesday night, Tim Tolle, a Campus Police officer said.

Tolle said, about 250 to 300 students were involved. A group of 20 students were first approached and warned, Tolle said, and the arrests were made around 11:30 p.m.

Campus Police were notified by authorities in Abel Residence Hall, Tolle said. He said it was reported that students were asking other members on the dormitory floors to participate in the snowball fight.

From Abel, the groups moved down 16th Street to R Street. Tolle said the arrests were made at the Harper-Schramm-Smith Complex at 16th Street.

"The only way we knew that it had been done was that I had been around for a number of years and remembered," Wagaman said.

The discrepancy is a matter of semantics, Vanselow said.

He said the Legislature appropriated money to replace lost capitation funds, but capitation funds were not cut so the state had nothing to replace, he said.

"It sounds to me like a technicality that some would call this a replacement," he said.

Vanselow said that during budget hearings with the Appropriations Committee he made it clear to the senators that the state had already replaced the funds.

In a telephone interview, Vanselow emphasized that the funds from the state were needed since the College of Dentistry receives less state funding than any other college of dentistry of comparable size in the United States.

Leuenberger said that the wise thing for the College of Dentistry to do when capitation funds were not cut would have been to save the money for a time when the funds would be cut instead of spending the capitation funds for equipment.

He said that by asking for the money this way, the dean of the college of dentistry, in effect, is saying "Look, we're becoming dependent on those funds. We're under-funded now and we need the money."

Leuenberger said asking for the money that way is "stupid politics."

The regents also have asked the Legislature to replace expected losses of state funds again this year for the medical center. Leuenberger said that if the capitation funds are not cut as expected the state will be left holding the bag.

Leuenberger said the regents should set aside state funds that would be used to cover future capitation losses. The regents should then wait and see if the federal cuts are forthcoming, he said.

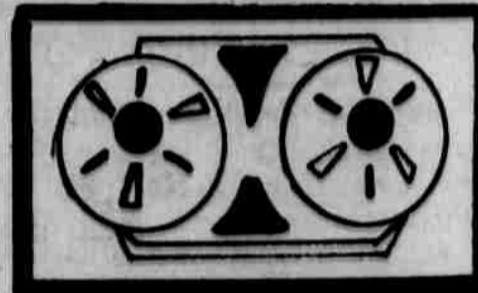
