

"We converted the Depression into World War II, as we cold not solve our economic problems.

"We got richer," Lens said, "based on faudulent prosperity by exploiting those from underdeveloped countries."

Lens told the audience that 1979 was the first year that a president deliberately lowered the standard of living, calling it a paradox that Carter thought a lowered standard of living would be in the nation's "best interest."
