New wave rock rising against American shores

Most anthologies are victims of the Billimurd plague before they are ever conceived. If a song hasn't made that magazine's Top 40, then it isn't even in the running.

In recent years, labels that specialize in new wave rock; Stiff, Beggar's Banqnet, and Sire, have released showcase anthologies of their talent in an attempt to break new bands in America.

1 R.S. Greatest Hits Vols. 2&3 continues in this vein with a four-sided chronicle of upbeat, highly danceable rock for the the new decade.

The International Record Syndicate's collection dissected here contains nothing ever heard on banal American airwayes. Some of the bands, however, are top sellers in eminently more dynamic English mark-

Britain is the breeding ground that produced the Beatles, Rolling Stones and the Who, and this is an encouraging document, proving that some freshness and vitality still exists in popular music in England, as well as the American underground.

Forceful R&B

The Fleshtones open the album with "Cold, Cold Shoes," a superb R&B boogie number accompanied by a cascading phalanx of a saxaphone to drive the rhythm along, Brian James, a former member of The Damned, continues with the mesmerizing ballad "Ain't That a Shame," punctuated by the crisp drumming of Police-man Stewart Copeland. The Police are omnipresent on the set, contributing their first English release, two solo efforts by Copeland, and general behind-the-scenes assistance by their old labalmates.

Unknowns abound, and "Baby Sign Here With Me" by Henri Badowski, gives a clear impression of the pitfalls of marriage in its Ray Davies-style of wit.

The father of new wave, punck rock, enters the scene on Alternative TV's "Action Time Vision." It is a steamroller of a song, with fiercely enunciated lyrics and lowest-common denominator heavymetal guitar. Squeeze follows with "Backtrack," a houserocker in the Jerry Lee Lewis tradition of piano hammering. Continued on Page 9


