Victor L. Lechtenberg, a professor of agronomy at Purdue University, said technology is becoming more prevalent among small farmers.

"In the next few years you'll see more and more technology at the production level," he said.

Lechtenberg said a December conference at Purdue on the small farmers' use of computers may draw 1,500 people.

Federal cutbacks may affect the level of

research at universities, Lechtenberg said, This would force universities to rely more on private companies for financing, he said.

Gregory said he thought President Ronald Reagan's economic policies will lower interest rates but, "as high as they are (now) that's not really too surprising,"

He said he thought Reagan's economic policies can work if they are given time. but, he added "America is an impatient country. We're trying to correct errors that were made years ago."

Hupp said the idea was started three years ago after the bonfires and destruction that preceded Nebraska's

17-14 victory over Oklahoma.

Since that time, the idea has caught on, and Hupp said each of ATO's 69 members make the week a personal thing.

"It's a time to reevaluate your own drinking habits," Hupp said.

"And not just for us, but for the people that see or hear about us doing it. They will start to wonder if they could stop drinking for a week." he added.

Two sororities, Kappa Alpha Theta and Delta Delta Delta are joining the

ATO's this year. With the sorority commitment, and ATO's non-resident members, Hupp estimates that about 250 to 300 persons will be participating.

Saturday, a "Dry Dance," open to the public. will be held at the Nebraska Union, Hupp said. The Star City Players will entertain at the 8 p.m. dance. and admission will be \$2 with proceeds going to a campus Alcohol Awareness fund, set up by the ATO's. The fund is available for groups to use for alcohol awareness projects. Hupp

"I would like to see this go campus wide among all Greeks soon," Hupp said. "I think it would leave people with a good impression about the UNL Greek system."
