Maritime conference set

UNL will be the host of the First International Conference on Maritime Antiquities Monday through Wednesday. The conference will be at the Nebraska Center, 33rd and Holdrege streets.

Representatives from France, Denmark, Australia, the Bahamas and the United States will attend. The purpose of the conference is to address the issue of preserving underwater archaeological sites from destruction. The destruction has been brought about in a rapid rate by man's increa-

sing exploration and exploitation of the world's oceans.

Members of the conference will be greeted by Mayor Helen Boosalis and will take a tour of the state Capitol.
