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Twisted Justice, another relatively new group on the scene, is a hard, fast, rebellious band which expresses a distaste for police brutality, fashion fads, and nuclear war.

"Police Brutality," "Designer This, Designer That," "Rock and Roll is Dead" and "System" are the samples that Twisted Justice chose to represent themselves on this tape.

Each of these songs seems to be dominated by short, sassy guitar licks and backed up by a powerful, quick beat from the drum.

The members of Twisted Justice are Matt Aldrup on bass, Andy Stanley on guitar, Shaun Theye on drums, and Al Wilson on "screams."

Rounding out side one is the song "Mc-Carthy" by Pogrom. The cut is a bizarre one that starts out like a news broadcast denouncing the political system of our society.

Side two continues with three more songs from Pogrom - "Kulterkampf," "Spontaneous Degeneration" and "Coeur D'Alene." This band has been together for about eight months and has gotten quite creative with its instrumentation. "Kulterkampf" is entirely instrumental with a significant emphasis on keyboards.

Pogrom is comprised of Bill Bored on bass, Jim Jones on keyboards, Joel Lamson on keyboards and vocals, and Rob Riley

on drums. Cartoon Pupils, a band of about nine months, adds a new dimension to the tape. In their first song "Anthem of Autumn," they combine some twangy, Touristssounding guitar riffs with a flirtatious,

distinctive drum. The other two songs, "Humans" and "Foreign Pictures," are fast jammers with quite provocative lyrics.

Cartoon Pupils is composed of Steve Canney on vocals, Harry Dingman on guitar, Bruce Stephen on drums, and Carl Stephen on bass.

The final group, Holiday, is new, having only been together for about a month when this tape was made. Nonetheless, they're a tight band that seems to have a lot of potential.

Holiday's three songs, "Letters to Mom," "Riding and Walking," and "Don't Say Goodnight" are all up-beat tunes with clear lyrics and complementary instrumentation that, at times, sounds a bit like the Pretenders, too.

Holiday is composed of Paul Engelhard on drums, Matthew Rutledge on guitar, Britta Wheeler on vocals, and Doug Wolfe on bass. Given the right exposure, Holiday is sure to become a local favorite in the not-too-distant future.

Rounding out side two of this tape is the song "It's a Secret," a kind of experiment by The Click's Morris and Hugh Briton, calling themselves Kyoto Dun-

This guitar, keyboard and metronome composition comes off well. It is a pleasant, seducing song that is most enjoyable and should be about ten minutes longer.

The program was taped live at Irwin's hit Broadway show at the American Palace








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
