Senate votes to end economic aid to Syria

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted Thursday to cut off the last remnants of U.S. economic aid to Syria because of continued Syrian involvement in fighting against the U.S.-backed Lebanese army. It also approved an amendment reducing U.S. contributions to international organizations that give financial assistance to Libya or Syria. Both measures were approved on a voice vote and still must be taken up in the House. The action to cut off aid to Syria followed adoption of an identical amendment by a Senate appropriations subcommittee despite concern the action could harm the sensitive negotiations for a ceasefire in Lebanon.

Newest state joins UN

UNITED NATIONS — The Security Council Thursday unanimously endorsed the application of Saint Christopher United Nations today as the 158th member. The Caribbean Island group, commonly called St. Kitts Nevis, has a population of 44,500 and will be one of the smallest states in the world body. It obtained independence from Britain Monday. It had been an associated state in the British Commonwealth.

High jump record topped

PEKING — China's Zhu Jianhua, 20, set a world record of 2.38 meters in the men's high jump Thursday and established himself as the firm favorite for the event at the 1983 Los Angeles Olympics. Zhu, 6-3, set the record with a back-roll over the bar at the fifth Chinese National Games in Shanghai. Zhu has been hailed as the standard-bearer of a growing band of Chinese athletes ready to challenge the world in their first Olympics, in Los Angeles.

Jet hijacked to Cuba

NEW YORK — A hijacker claiming to have a bomb strapped to his body Thursday forced an American Airlines Boeing 727 jet with 112 people to fly to Cuba, a company official said. The spokesman said the plane, hijacked while flying vacationers from New York to the Virgin Islands, landed in Havana, where the hijacker was arrested. The spokesman said the plane was scheduled to fly from Havana to San Juan, Puerto Rico, Thursday afternoon. The hijacking was the 11th to Cuba from a U.S. airport since May.

Australia II draws even

NEWPORT, R.I. — Australia II on Thursday became the first challenger ever to win three races in an America's Cup final when it crushed Liberty by about half a mile to even up the best-of-seven series at three victories apiece. It was the second straight triumph by the Australian yacht which became the first challenger to capture two consecutive races in a Cup series since 1934.

Dow hits all-time high

NEW YORK — A rush of institutional buying of technology shares sent Wall Street stock prices to record highs Thursday. The Dow Jones Industrial Index, which on Tuesday closed at an all-time high of 1249.19, rose 14.23 points Thursday to finish at 1267.52. Analysts said hopes that interest rates might have peaked continued to boost stock prices.

Elephants massacred

NAIROBI, Kenya — Poachers may have massacred as many as half of Sudan's 135,000 elephants, sometimes with the help of government officials, a leading conservationist said today. "The introduction of automatic weapons into southern Sudan over the past four years has resulted in a disaster for elephants there, which are being wiped out for the benefit of ivory traders," Ian Douglas-Hamilton told Reuters. Ivory may have become "the currency of personal monetary advancement" in southern Sudan.
