

## Police Report

Grounds Department Director Bud Dasenbrock is offering a \$25 reward for information leading to the identification of the person or persons who reportedly struck a grounds worker with a butterknife Tuesday near Harper Hall.

Dasenbrock said he has taken similar action in the past when employees were assaulted or harassed. Tuesday's incident was not the first this year, he said.

Dasenbrock said he has requested that his crews not enter two housing areas because of such incidents that have happened in the past. The most common occurrence is objects being thrown out of windows, he said.

Dasenbrock said he would like to offer the reward through the Crimestoppers program so informant's name could remain confidential.

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## Plans to reopen libraries debated

Representatives from the UNL student government and the university administration met Thursday to discuss plans to keep campus libraries open on home football game Saturdays.

The libraries were ordered closed on the six home football Saturdays by Dean of Libraries Gerald Rudolph. Rudolph cited budget shortfalls as the reason for the closings.

Matt Wallace, president of the Association of Students of the University of Nebraska, said a possible solution to the problem was being considered by John Strong, vice chancellor of academic affairs.

The proposal calls for the libraries to be opened for the last three home football Saturdays if funding deferrals can be found in the library budget.

Wallace said the deferrals would not mean taking money from the library budget. He said money already in the budget would be reallocated to keep the libraries open.

"This looks like a very viable option at this point," Wallace said.

Future meetings have been scheduled to discuss the plan, he said. If the proposal is approved, the first home football Saturday that the libraries would be open would be Oct. 22, when Colorado plays in Lincoln.

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
