The atudent teaching program at UNLS Teachers College was rated the nation's aneat in a recent study conducted by Northem Illinoia University.
UNL wes one of four out of 902 colleges and universities surveyed that met 21 of the 24 standards of quality developed for the study, according to a press release.

Criteria included the experience andeducation of supervisors, and the design of pre-student teaching practicum experiences.
James OHfanlon, Teachers Colloge dean, attributed the success of the program to the support given by Líncoln teachers.
"We've worked together with a number of teachers from Lincoln schools," he sald, We share this award."

Currently, UNL student teachers are working in 37 school districts throughout Nebraska. The major part of the program is conducted in the IIncoln Public Schools.
"A lot of other schools say it's a bother" to have student teachers, O'Hanlon said. "But teachers really use them in very important ways."
The student teaching process begins in a person's sophomore year, and gradually phases into the junior and senior years.
The college's student teaching program has been nationally recognized three times in the past four nationaliy recognized turee cimes in the past four years. Besides its latest top ranling, the program received the Distinguished Teacher Education 1079.
