## U.N. spokesman: System of apartheid must go


The United Nations considers South Africa's system of apartheid a "crime against humanity," a U.N. spokesman said Friday.

Abdennour Abrous, chief of the United Nations Center Against Apartheid, spoke in the Nebraska Union about U.N. condemnation of and policies against South Africa's system of strict racial segregation. The system is the only system of institutional discrimination in the world, he said.

The United Nations has been following the situation in South Africa since 1946, Abrous said. Its first approach to the problem was to work with South African leaders to try to convince them the system was wrong, he said, adding that this had no effect. In 1960, the United Nations began advocating the economic, social and cultural isolation of South Africa, Abrous said.

This policy of isolation is still followed, and all U.N. members are encouraged to participate, he said.

— Lighting and Security: will examine the lighting and security situations on both City and East campuses, determine where problems exist and make recommendations to RHA and UNL on ways to help improve these conditions.

— Parking: will examine the current parking altuntion at UNL and will make suggestions to the RHA on ways to help improve the present parking altuation.

Because RHA is encouraging that many get involved, the number of committee positions available is not restricted, RHA President Bob Wolz said. Also, if one or a group of hall residents discovers a problem that is not being recognised, RHA might form a committee to analyze and attend to the problem.
